# COVID-19: The effect of lockdown measures on young people in inpatient units

'...the risk of human rights abuses are even greater...Unlawful blanket bans on visits, the suspension of routine inspections, the increased use of restraint and solitary confinement, and the vulnerability of those in detention to infection with COVID-19... mean that the situation is now a severe crisis' - Joint Committee on Human Rights report, June 2020.

### **Delayed discharge**

**25** people had their discharge delayed.

Main reasons: **lack of social care** and **lack of suitable housing** in the community.

People with a learning disability and/or autism who are sent to inpatient units are there for an average of
