The key questions for this workshop are:

Part 1- Discussion – emphasis on ACTION not the problems

- What needs to happen to create 'readiness' in the system and make sure all parts are working together?
- How can we overcome regional variation?
- How do we ensure 'readiness' at all levels of the system local, regional, national all working together

Part 2- Action planning – individual and collective actions

- As a CBNSG (individually and collectively) how can we make it happen at a local / individual, regional, or national level?
- What actions, by whom, will need to be taken following the meeting?
- Allocation of actions to make it happen, with timescales.

The objectives are to:

• Identify what can we do ourselves, right now, to ensure community housing is ready and is sufficiently resourced to meet the needs of people with learning disabilities.

Challenges

- Lack of progress- for every year since the start of the Transforming Care Programme, lack of suitable housing has been the main reason for delayed discharge.
- Lack of basic and specialist learning disability and autism housing knowledge and strategic planning.
- Poor use of data that should be used to allocate investment- focusing on the wrong issues (i.e number of hospital beds rather than the state of current community houses).
- Siloed ways of working and not working in co-production with families. Different agencies and departments using different terminology.
- Waiting lists are too difficult to progress through and process and takes too long to access funding. Multiple levels of sign-off. Underlying solutions are also not quick, and families are not encouraged to think about it early.
- Transition to housing how early?
- Crisis housing

Opportunities: some examples of existing initiatives include...

- New Assuring Transformation data collection
- Community Discharge Plan
- Building The Right Support Delivery Board- housing strategy
- NHSE £100m in capital grants

Discussion

- 1) The process is unclear, inconsistent and confusing. There's not enough expertise.
 - Different agencies are siloed, and different departments are using different terminologies.
 - People don't know their options; it's not thought about early enough. Families should have time to speak to multiple housing providers.
 - External Support Group needs housing expertise? Be able to provide support.
 - Social workers lack the necessary housing expertise to deliver good outcomes for families
 - Need one stop shop myth busting FAQs around housing.

2) Joined up working

- When planning for discharge from ATUs, are the right people at meetings? E.g. Are Local Authorities involved in hospital meetings right from the beginning? Examples of Occupational Therapist only joining meetings the day before individual moved into a house.
 - MHA Section 117 need clearer guidance about who should be at meetings, ask families and if don't know who else then find out.
- Family case study of CHC and LA/housing not co-operating e.g. Psychiatrist was asked to section but had no information.

- Need to help people understand that if you invest well, it will last a long time.
- Multi agencies compiling information through a simple template/checklist to understand the person and their housing needs; thinking logically; planning ahead.

3) Co-production, working together

- Housing advocates are viewed with suspicion.
- When doing adaptations, needs consortium of people with necessary expertise.
- Gathering experts in a particular area to work together on housing- is this in the BTRS strategy?
- 4) Responsibility and accountability- a rights-based approach
 - Authorities fail to take responsibility for adaptions to the environment; family end up having to do it; often un-funded.
 - Need a vision for right to home.
 - Everyone is entitled to have a home; build this issue within a human rights framework.
 - Commissioners allow (and support) providers buying multiple houses and adapting them before they know an individual's housing needs.
 - LDA and ADASS guidance for Commissioners should be followed. **Action**: Find this guidance and share with the group.
 - Need to think about this issue proactively.

5) Funding

- Generalised housing grants disincentivize areas from including specialist housing in planning. When people think housing for this group, they think social services.
- What happened to the brokerage scheme?
- The private sector is not motivated to deliver good outcomes for individuals.
- Possible Solutions:
 - Allocate money when children are in school. Pot of money that follows the person. For every individual child – expectation that they will move out of home.
 - Persuade someone to revisit the government mortgage scheme? NHS can't release mortgages.
 - o Ethical finance consortium with the right values.
